




This reader is meant for the absolute beginner to pick up and begin reading Latin and learning vocabulary and grammar from context.

UPPER SCHOOL UNIFORM

What's the point of a uniform or dress code?

- Dress code helps students prepare their minds for the day's work by putting on attire that shows respect and reverence for the learning that goes on in school.
- When students pass through our doors, they become a part of something larger than themselves.
 - Students at Ascent wear our uniform to show that they are representatives of the school community. They are not customers of the school, but active participants in its work.
 - Wearing the uniform shows that all students are here for the same purpose: to develop their minds and improve their hearts for the purpose of living truly happy lives.
- Dress code presents a daily opportunity for character development.
 - There is nothing inherently moral about khaki or navy skirts, orange or purple socks. Each morning, however, a student has the chance to know what is expected of them in the dress code and can choose to meet that expectation or not. They can practice virtue and comply with the expectations, or practice vice and choose to break expectations.
 - Whether or not a uniform violation is caught, the habit of virtue or vice is already forming. We ask our parents to partner with us in forming young men and women of character by reinforcing the importance of following dress code as a matter of the heart, rather than of comfort or style.

MIDDLE SCHOOL ELECTIVES

7th and 8th graders will have the option to participate in two electives. These classes will rotate on an A/B day schedule with each class meeting five times total every two weeks. ACANC wants to place students in the classes of their preference; however, should more students request a class than there are seats available, spaces in the class will be assigned based on class seniority, then by first come, first serve.

Physical education and composition are required courses in middle school and are therefore not available as elective choices.







MIDDLE SCHOOL ELECTIVES

Middle School: Beginning Art

Students in 7th and 8th grade will learn about art history, artists, elements of art and principles of design. Students will use a variety of mediums to create their art. These students will be required to participate in at least one art show a year.

Prerequisites: No prerequisite is required for this class..

Middle School: Orchestra

This orchestra class is open to any student in 7th and 8th grade who plays an orchestral string instrument. Students will be expected to perform in two concerts a year.

Prerequisites: Please contact Mrs. May at <u>jen.may@nc.ascentcolorado.org</u> to set up an audition. If your student wants to learn how to play an orchestral string instrument please reach out and we can discuss various options that best fit your needs.

Middle School: Advanced Band

This band is open to any student in 7th and 8th grade who has at least one year of experience on their instrument and who set up an audition with Mrs. May. Students will practice more advanced techniques for their instrument and delve into beginning concert music repertoire. Students will be expected to perform in two concerts a year.

Prerequisites: The prerequisite for this course is Middle School Beginning Band, or a successful audition for <u>Mrs. May</u> by May 20th or by Aug. 20th for incoming students.









MIDDLE SCHOOL ELECTIVES

Middle School: Beginning Choir

This class is open to all students in 7th and 8th grade. Students will learn the fundamentals of singing, music theory, vocal warmups and techniques. Students will be performing music and be expected to sing in both the Winter and Spring Concert.

Prerequisites: No prerequisite is required for this class.

Middle School: Advanced Choir

This class is open to all students in 7th and 8th grade. Students will focus on more advanced singing techniques, music theory, vocal warmups. Students will be performing music and be expected to sing in both the Winter and Spring Concert.

Prerequisites: An audition for Mr. Henreckson by May 20th or incoming students by Aug. 20th

Middle School: Speech and Debate

Utilizing rhetoric as it is traditionally meant, students will engage with assignments, activities, and discussions meant to improve their understanding of speech and debate as well as their ability to civilly communicate their own ideas with clarity, efficiency, and emotion. Additionally, students will research and argue for ideas they do not necessarily agree with, in order to see a variety of perspectives on ideas which shape our modern world.

Prerequisites: No prerequisite is required for this class..

Middle School: Beginning Theater

Students will learn about the history of theater, and the basics of acting. Students will be expected to complete a final project of some kind at the end of each semester.

Prerequisites: No prerequisite is required for this class..

HIGH SCHOOL ELECTIVES

High schoolers will choose one elective to pursue for the entirety of the year. Should there be more interest in a class than available seats, spaces will be assigned according to class seniority, then by GPA.

Rising 11th and 12th Graders - please see the bottom section regarding your language elective.

We will only be offering advanced sections of choir and band in the 24-25 school year. Students who are new to choir and band are welcome to join, but should recognize that more work will be necessary to participate at the level of the class. Art, Theater and Speech/Debate are offered at an intermediate level and are good options for students with little experience in choir and band.

HIGH SCHOOL: INTERMEDIATE ART (9-12 GRADE)

High School students will delve into intermediate art techniques and mediums. Students will expand their artistic vocabulary by critiquing artwork. These students will be required to participate in two art shows a year.

Prerequisites: Middle School Art. Students who have not completed the prerequisite may still register for the class, but must understand that more work will be expected of them to perform at the level of the class. A Portfolio review will be required with Mr. Howe by May 20th for current students or Aug. 20th for incoming students.

HIGH SCHOOL: ADVANCED ART (10-12 GRADE ONLY)

High School students will delve into advanced art techniques and mediums. Students will expand their artistic vocabulary by critiquing artwork and explaining the methodology of their work. These students will be required to participate in two art shows a year.

Prerequisites: A High School Art Class. Students who have not completed the prerequisite may still register for the class, but must understand that more work will be expected of them to perform at the level of the class. A portfolio review will be required with Mr. Howe by May 20th for current students or Aug. 20th for incoming students.

HIGH SCHOOL ELECTIVES

HIGH SCHOOL: BAND

This ensemble consists of high school students who have successfully auditioned and have been playing their instrument for at least 1 year. Students will dive into advanced techniques on their instruments, learn about composers, music theory, history, and musicality. These students will be the ones representing their school at events such as athletic events, parades, and ceremonies.

Prerequisites: Middle School Band. Students who have not completed the prerequisite may still register for the class, but must understand that more work will be expected of them to perform at the level of the class. Students will need audition for band by May 20th for current students or Aug. 20th for incoming students.

HIGH SCHOOL: CHOIR

This class is open to all high school students. Students will build upon the fundamentals they learned in middle school and discuss and perform advanced techniques and repertoire. This ensemble will be the highest choir available to students which means that they may be expected to perform for events in the community on top of our school concerts.

Prerequisites: Middle School Choir. Students who have not completed the prerequisite may still register for the class, but must understand that more work will be expected of them to perform at the level of the class.







HIGH SCHOOL ELECTIVES

High School: Speech and Debate

Utilizing rhetoric as it is traditionally meant, students will engage with assignments, activities, and discussions meant to improve their understanding of speech and debate as well as their ability to civilly communicate their own ideas with clarity, efficiency, and emotion.




UPPER SCHOOL CLUBS
